


Getting Around in Washington DC

The rail and bus systems in the Washington Metropolitan Area are called the metrorail (or simply the metro) and the metrobus. Both trains and buses run throughout Washington DC and into suburban Virginia and Maryland. Metrorail connects the city to Reagan National Airport and metrobus service is available to Dulles Airport. Maps, routes, bus schedules, and detailed fare information are available on the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority website http://www.wmata.com. The website also has a trip planner which gives bus and rail connections and travel costs between places.



Metrorail




Cost: Metrorail cost varies with distance traveled and time of day. (Peak fares: before 9:30 am, between 3 and 7 pm, and after midnight on Friday and Saturday.) You must purchase a SmarTrip fare card from a vending machine at a station and touch it to a gate sensor before boarding and after exiting a train. You can purchase a card for the exact fare from one station to another or for a larger amount that allows you to make more than one trip. You can also add value to your card at the vending machines. All machines accept cash, credit and debit cards. If you use cash, note that the machines only provide up to \$10 in change. A Smart trip App is also available for download which allows you to use your phone as a card. To read more about that please visit mobilepay. A One Day Pass is available for unlimited metrorail and metrobus rides for \$13.00. The Trip Planner at http://www.wmata.com is an excellent resource to calculate fares and routes.

Hours: Mon-Thurs: 5 am-12 am; Fri: 5 am-1 am; Sat: 7 am-1 am; Sun: 7 am-1 am.

Finding Metrorail stations: See the Transit Authority website for a map of rail lines and stations. Signs with a large "M" identify station entrances, and one or more colored stripes identify the line(s) served by each station. (Green Line, Red Line, etc.) The Omni Shoreham Hotel is located one-half block from the Red Line's Woodley Park/Zoo/Adams Morgan metro stop on Connecticut Avenue.

Metrobus





Cost: Bus fare is \$2 within the city and higher on routes that are express or go beyond the city. *You must have the exact fare in cash* or present a metro fare card that has the required balance.

Hours: 24 hours a day, seven days a week, but service frequency varies with the time of day and night.

Finding bus stops: See the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority website http://www.wmata.com for bus stops, which are easily identified by red, white and blue signs.

Uber, Lyft, Taxi




All are available in DC. Taxis often wait outside the hotel, and they can be hailed on any busy street.

Cost: Uber and Lyft inform you of the fare when you request a ride. The minimum taxi fare is \$3.50, and the charge for each additional mile is \$2.16. Each additional passenger is charged \$1.20 per mile. For a trip originating at the Reagan National Airport taxi stand, you will pay a \$2.50 surcharge and a \$.50 fee per bag placed in the trunk. (Metrobus or airport shuttles are better from Dulles, which is a considerable distance from DC.)



Museums, Monuments, and Other Interesting Places



Washington DC is a city of outstanding museums and monuments that honor people, events, and moments in history.

Below is a selection of these attractions and information about their locations and hours. This is by no means a comprehensive list. For more complete information, see the city's official tourism site, http://www.washington.org.

Note that a number of the federal buildings, such as the Bureau of Printing and Engraving, offer behind-the scenes tours. However, the covid pandemic has changed many procedures. Please visit the website for the most up to date information. The hotel concierge can also assist you with questions and tour reservations.

White House

1600 Pennsylvania Avenue NW. Metrorail stations: Farragut West and McPherson Square. Tours may be arranged through a member of congress. At this time the National Park Service is not organizing tours. Other inside access is not permitted.

National Zoo

3001 Connecticut Avenue NW. Admission is free but entry passes are required. The zoo is within walking distance of the Omni Shoreham Hotel. Officially part of the Smithsonian Institution complex, the zoo grounds are open from 8 am to 4 pm.

Arlington National Cemetery

Memorial Drive, Fort Myer, Virginia

Metrorail station: Arlington Cemetery. The cemetery is open from 8 am to 5 pm, and admission is free. Visitors can see the graves of thousands of men and women who served in the U.S. military, the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and the graves of John F. Kennedy and many other famous Americans.

U.S. Holocaust Museum

100 Raoul Wallenberg Place SW. Metrorail station: Smithsonian. This internationally acclaimed museum tells the story of the Holocaust through artifacts, films, photos, and oral histories. The museum is open daily from 10 am to 5:30 pm, and admission is free. Timedentry tickets are required.



National Cathedral

3101 Wisconsin Ave. NW. No metrorail station is nearby. See the metro website trip planner for a bus connection (or walk the 1.4 miles from the Omni Shoreham hotel). Open 10 am to 5 pm Monday through Friday; 10 am to 4 pm Saturday; 12:45 to 4 pm Sunday. Tours are scheduled every half hour, Monday through Friday, between 10:15 and 11:15 am and 1 pm and 3:30 pm; Saturdays between 10:15 am and 3 pm. A tour is included in the \$15 cost of admission.

U.S. Capitol Building

Visitor Center: Intersection of East Capitol St. NE and First Street NE. Metrorail station: Capitol South. Admission is free, and the Capitol is open Monday - Saturday, 8:30 to 3:30. Currently entry to the Capitol Visitor Center is only available to those with tour reservations. Advance reservations are required for a tour. Visit the Schedule a Tour page to select a day/time.



Supreme Court

First St. NE and Maryland Ave. NE. Metrorail station: Union Station. The Supreme Court is open for official business but is currently not accepting visitors.

FDR Memorial

400 West Basin Drive SW. Metrorail station: Smithsonian. (Requires a walk; bus service is more direct.) This site depicts the pivotal years of Franklin Delano Roosevelt's presidency through a series of four outdoor galleries. Open 24 hours a day.

Jefferson Memorial

701 East Basin Drive SW. Metrorail station:

Smithsonian

Requires a walk; bus service is more direct.) Open 24 hours a day. The memorial celebrates Thomas Jefferson as the primary author of the Declaration of Independence and reflects his love of classical architecture.

National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial

605 E St. NW, between 4th and 5thStreets NW. Metrorail station: Judiciary Square. Marble walls display the names of more than 17,000 federal, state, and local law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty. Open 24 hours/day.

International Spy Museum

700 L'Enfant Plaza, SW. Metrorail station: L'Enfant Plaza. Open daily 10 am to 6 pm. Admission: \$27.95. (College student discount available.) This is world's only public museum that is dedicated to the tradecraft, history, and contemporary role of espionage. Self-guided 1.5 to 2 hour tours. Advanced tickets encouraged.

National Archives

700 Pennsylvania Ave. NW. Metrorail station: Archives/Navy Memorial/Penn Quarter. Open daily 10 am to 5:30 pm. (Last admission 5 pm.) Admission is free. The Archives house the original copies of the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, the Louisiana Purchase Treaty, and the Emancipation Proclamation, as well as collections of photography and historically significant American artifacts.

14th & C Streets SW. Metrorail station: Smithsonian. (Use the Independence Ave. exit.) This building is currently closed to visitors due to the pandemic.



National Mall

Metrorail station: Smithsonian. The mall is an inviting green park that extends for about two miles west from the U.S. Capitol Building. This is where you will find most of the **Smithsonian Museums** listed on page 2.
